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OUR GENESIS

All it took was an innocuous visit to a relative's house in the late 1970s which set off a pre-destined chain of events culminating in the founding of the Tauheedul Muslimeen Trust. The story goes that Dr. Kalbe Sadiq was approached by an unknown man while visiting one of his relatives. The stranger requested him to accompany him to his shabby house, where he saw a young boy studying away in the dim, flickering light of an oil lamp. "He's my son," the man said. "He is keen to study and extremely hardworking. However, I do not have the means to fulfill his wish." Deeply moved by the sight, Dr Sadiq engaged with the boy over a chat and was duly impressed with the latter's intellectual abilities and diligence. Dr Sadiq had the foresight to realize that given a chance, this young boy had great potential to academically excel, and become a means of uplifting his family out of poverty.

Without further ado, Dr. Sadig wrote a letter to his Mumbai-based acquaintance, Late Mr. Jafar Ali Aseel, with a humble request to support the boy's education. Mr. Aseel graciously agreed to sponsor the child's education for two years. Thanks to this act of charity, the beneficiary was able to complete his graduation scoring very good marks. This incident opened Dr. Sadiq's eyes to the grim realization that there were many children from similar marginalized backgrounds who lacked the opportunity and access to basic education. He thus continued the work of identifying needy, deserving children and connecting them with altruistic friends and acquaintances who were willing to sponsor their education. However, it was also becoming increasingly clear that this was a systemic issue faced by India's Muslim community, and needed a structured, longterm approach and intervention to achieve large-scale social impact.

With this intention in mind, diverse professionals from the educational sector were brought together in 1984 to form the Tauheedul Muslimeen Trust (TMT) - a nonprofit organization aimed at the educational, social and material upliftment of the under privileged community. The goal of the Trust calls for education as a means to rid the community of the entwined social ills of ignorance and poverty. Given its humble beginning, TMT's progress over the years has been nothing short of remarkable. The first institution set up in 1987 under the aegis of TMT was Unity College, which started off as a small, rented room fitted with the most basic infrastructure and a handful of students. As with any new venture, TMT's beginning was fraught with challenges - one being the regressive attitude of parents towards their children's education. Over time, this shifted largely due to the awareness-raising efforts of TMT members and an innate understanding about the noble nature of the venture, which was not only professionally run right from the start but had the financial and moral backing of several supporters from the community. A little more than a decade later witnessed the establishment of the Unity College Second Shift with an initial strength of nine students and an aim to provide free education to underprivileged and deserving children. Today, 33 years down the road, both Unity College and Unity College Second Shift boast an enviable enrolment of 3,500 students, a world-class academic program, an expert faculty, and a state-of-the-art campus.

In addition to Unity College, TMT also runs other educational and medical institutions as well as charity programmes. As it transitions from one milestone to the other, TMT remains humbly and eternally grateful to the donors for their unwavering support which enabled our dream - to impact and elevate the lives of disadvantaged children through the invaluable gift of education - to manifest into reality.

FROM THE SECRETARY'S DESK

DR. S. KALBE SADIQ'S MESSAGE



This is the thirty-fifth annual report which I am presenting before you. The significance of this report is that I have prepared it during my extreme sickness of the last two years. My health conditions do not allow me to move, in short, it has paralyzed me to some extent. Despite all challenges, I have maintained my tradition of producing information with complete authenticity and without any exaggeration. The information I am producing is truly verifiable and flawless. I do not want to describe my ailment in this report but for the reference of the readers, I would like to let you know that I am not in good health as before. Doctors prescribed two operations as the treatment out which I have undergone from the first procedure which was successful, Alhamdullillah. Anyways I want to submit before you that this mission is not for any personal propaganda or publicity. The mission which is carried out by me and my team members is to fulfill the basic requirements of our society.

Poverty and illiteracy are the biggest challenges of our society today and this is a humble effort of my team members to eradicate them up to the extent. Our ethnicity is blessed with the power of the pulpit. The outcome of any power or force depends upon the way it is used. We have witnessed this pulpit has been instrumental in bringing about much needed socio economic revolution in many parts of the world. Universities and Pulpit have come together to make nations and communities free from the shackles of poverty and illiteracy. But unfortunately, in our country we allow anyone to take a position on the pulpit. There is no defined qualification for anyone to speak from the pulpit. It has resulted that people who have raw or very least knowledge of Quran, Hadith, and Religion are delivering sermons for the top of the pulpit. It did nothing but dividing the community into small groups of followings.

Let me tell you two basic things about Islam. One is Wisdom and the other is Justice. Here I will discuss wisdom. Humans are the best creation of Allah Subhanhu Taala. All creations in this world have emotions and natural urge, but humans are enthroned with wisdom as a guide for emotions. This makes him different from other creations. It makes a basic difference in approach towards any problem. Humans have a rational approach and others take it emotionally. And when humans become emotional leaving behind rational approach destruction takes place. Let me come to my original topic that pulpits have made our community emotional. Our people are going away from knowledge and logical approach. I would like to submit that food for wisdom is knowledge. Islam invites people to strengthen their logical approach. Thoughtfulness builds strong and worthy rational. Quran and Hadith emphasize on knowledge and wisdom than any other thing. We have evident examples where scholars on the pulpits did their job well and earned prosperity and power. Where visionary and rational scholars and clerics took over the bridle and guided masses towards a strong and prosperous society. I want to put forward the example of Lebanon as well. I look back sixty, seventy years, the Shia society in Lebanon was not different from our poverty ridden community residing in some parts of

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old Lucknow and other places. Deprived, weak, illiterate and sufferers were in abundance, but a wise cleric Imam Musa Sadr paved the path of revolution and transformed that community from sufferers to achievers. He opened schools with modern education everywhere, managed funds from all over the world. People followed him religiously and made education priority. When education and wealth came together honor came brimmed at its own. I can tell you with complete authority that this neglected community rose up to the extent that the constitution of Lebanon had to change and today they not only have active participation in the political setup but also share a permanent seat as Speaker of parliament of Lebanon.

Several people ask me if I emphasize on worldly knowledge or religious knowledge. To them practicing rituals is religion seeking its knowledge is religious knowledge. Unfortunately, they have the least idea of the definition of both the knowledge. Let me tell you that both streams cannot be determined through the topics or subjects, it could be determined through the purpose of the study. If someone is seeking knowledge to satisfy worldly ambitions it is a worldly knowledge but if the purpose of getting the knowledge is to benefit humanity it becomes religious knowledge. Right from scientific studies to so-called religious studies all inclusively follow this rule. In a nutshell, selfish knowledge is a worldly knowledge whereas the selfless knowledge is religious knowledge.

If I look around in India, at first I find very few Madrasas in our community, and unfortunately, most of them are in very poor condition. Bad nutrition, the worst infrastructure and outdated course material all push back students to early ages. These Madrasas require a thorough makeover, we should work on it united. I remember my meeting with Aytullah Seestani in which he ordered me to open the schools of modern education, technical colleges, medical colleges in my country which I am trying to follow. I have a book by Aytullah Makarim Sheerazi who is pretty close to Marjaiyat, in which he discusses topics scientifically. One can wonder that this book is authored by a religious cleric or a scientist.

Let me tell you that knowledge is the only key

to success and honor. Our community has to come up with the structure of modern education build on a strong religious base. The time has come when we modernize our ideas, become rational thinkers and apply wisdom while finding any solution.

I have so many stories to share with you, but in this short note, just one will be fine enough. I visited a friend in Washington days back. When I reached his place I saw that his daughter wanted to go to the school in Hijab, but their parents were afraid that she may be hurt due to her looks. They asked me what to do in such a situation. I suggested, let the girl go to the school in Hijab, if she gets hurt then I will put my suggestion. When I visited him next I came to know that everything was fine, and due to her Hijab other Muslim girls in her school began wearing Hijab. This was one side of the story. After a few years, I visited Washington again and I came to know that she has become an atheist. It was so because she could not answer the questions raised by her fellows. Since she had not been taught religion, reasonably she could not answer logical questions and end up on atheism. Through this story, I wish to bring your attention to this point that we need to lay a strong foundation based on rational knowledge of religion to build a strong community. I, therefore, request all parents to spend their maximum resources on the education of the young generation. Hence need is to work on both the fronts, we need to modernize Madrasas as well as open new schools and invest in the education of the community.

Education is essential to lifting a population out of poverty. Invest in the

quality education of your children- whether girls or boys- remember Islam does not discriminate, it is we who created these socio-cultural gender biases. According to the World Bank, giving girls access to schooling is a central part of eradicating global poverty, as better educated women tend to be healthier, participate more in formal labour markets, and manage their families well. In the words of Prophet Muhammad (PBUH), education is not only the right, but the duty of every Muslim, male or female. The best gift from a father to his child is education and upbringing.






EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Founded in 1984, Tauheedul Muslimeen Trust comprises of several diverse projects, allied institutions as well as aid programmes including the Unity College, Unity College Second Shift, Lucknow; MU College Aligarh; Unity Private Industrial Training Institute; Unity Education Program (UEP); HIZA Charitable Hospital; TMT's Educational Aid, Medical Aid and General Aid programmes. All these initiatives are geared towards providing the underprivileged community with easily accessible and affordable education, healthcare, vocational training and means of livelihood as to allow them to live with dignity and independence.

As we mark more than three and a half decade of service, I would like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere thanks to the entire TMT community - the donors, beneficiaries, students and team members for their steadfast commitment and contribution without which we would not be crossing this important milestone today. Behind every achievement of TMT lies a story of struggle, grit and perseverance, which has helped us survive, sustain and emerge stronger than ever. Yet, we are nowhere near the finish line. There is a long way to go, many dreams to fulfil, and many challenges to overcome, in our vision of empowering the under privileged and needy.

The report below provides a brief summary of key outcomes, challenges, and areas for improvement or opportunities for each TMT programme for the period 2019-2020.



ABOUT

Established in 1987 under the aegis of TMT, CISCE-affiliated Unity College imparts quality coeducation to over 1900 children from nursery to Class XII with a goal to support their holistic development and inculcate in them values of responsible citizenship, peace, compassion and mutual co-existence.

Spread over a 5.75-acre lush and beautifully landscaped campus and total constructed areas of 75,000 square feet, Unity College boasts state-of-the-art facilities such as Activity Room- a space for students to express themselves; advanced e-learning tools supported by smart classrooms equipped with digital smart boards and LCD projectors; and a host of extra-curricular activities designed to ensure creative, uninterrupted and joyful learning for its students. Meanwhile, budding sport enthusiasts can look forward to an array of sport options ranging from a well-maintained football field, a cricket ground, a basketball court, a volleyball court, a badminton court to table tennis facilities.

SALIENT HIGHLIGHTS

Unity students again achieved excellent results in ICSE and ISC. Students secured 100% result with average of 81.22% in ISC and 75.58% in ICSE. A total of 116 students appeared for ISC, out of which 20 students scored 90% & above while 48 students scored 80% & above. In ICSE, out of 116 students, 10 students scored 90% & above, whereas 29 students scored 80% & above.

- In Interschool Sports events organized by Council for ICSE schools Unity athletic team of 6 students stole the limelight by bagging 5 gold, 3 silver and 5 bronze. In Football Unity Junior team and Volley Ball girls team came out champions of the tournament.
- Nine students from the school football team selected for regional-level ASISC inter School Football Tournament at Dehradun and Mohd Danish of Unity cricket team was selected to represent ASISC UP School Cricket Team.
- In the second year of the NCC training, a total of nine Cadets from Class IX of Unity College attended the CAT Camp.
- Teaching faculty and in charge of NCC Ms. Jafri received the ANO training at Officers Training Academy, Gwalior and got commissioned as ANO (Third Officer).
 - Round the year Unity student participated in inter school extracurricular competitions as well and bagged position. To list some - Eight talented students won the 2nd place in 'Innovation' at 'Expressions', a literary Festival organized by St. Francis College. Four senior girls helped Unity to win second place in Liron "A Poetry Rendition" competition' held between 14 reputed schools. Unity team lifted the Best Performer Award at the Bait Bazi Contest at Uttar Pradesh Urdu Academy on 6th November, 2018. Syed Ali Jibran Rizvi of Class X-B was honoured with the "Star Achiever of the Month" by Times NIE and he also bagged the second position in Inter-School Poster-Making Competition organized by UP Tourism.

KEY OUTCOMES

In ISC (XII) out of 124, 13 students secured 90% while 43 scored between 80% - 90%.

In ICSE (X) out of 115, 14 students secured 90% while 28 students obtained 80% and above.

NCC for Girls was introduced

Students achieved Top positions in Inter School Sports and Extracurricular events. Initiating the up gradation of campus Electrical Infrastructure including switching to LED lighting.

State-of-the-art Dental Clinic established on campus by Vancouver's Global Kindness Foundation.

Phonetics-based English teaching driving good results for the past few years.

CHALLENGES

- Due to relatively low fee structure and financial capacity of parents, it is difficult to retain and attract good teachers at competitive salaries.
- Switching the teaching methodology from traditional rote learning to interactive student centred methodology.
- The cost of operations is being met by fee with no fiscal deficit, however infrastructure development and expansion work are being funded by TMT's donor base.
- Parental cooperation and participation lags behind in development of the students.

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

- Majority of pass-outs enroll for professional courses at private universities. Produce students with high competitive edge and facilitate admissions to premiere institutes like IITs and IIMs.
- To replace rote learning with student centred interactive teaching.
- Improvement upon numerical, communication skills (English language) of our students.














ABOUT

What began as a modest set-up in 1999 with just 17 students has metamorphosed into a full-fledged school with 1,400 students who receive free education as part of Unity College Second Shift's goal to provide equal educational opportunity to children irrespective of their financial backgrounds. Classes for Nursery all through to Intermediate (Class 12th) are held between 2-6 pm on weekdays with students having complete access to the entire academic and activity infrastructure available to their Unity College morning shift counterparts. Initially a Hindi Medium School the class are being gradually converted to English medium and till 2019 classes' up till VIII have been successfully converted to English medium to cater to the demands of the globalized and competitive market.

SALIENT HIGHLIGHTS

- 100% pass result in Class X and XII
- Pre-primary and primary sections adopted English as medium of instruction

- Teaching taking place as per Montessori system in Pre Primary section of the school
- Student-centred teaching (SCT) adopted in primary section.
- Career counselling sessions by experts for Class X and XII students.
- Unity 40 coaching to foster employability started for B. Com Graduates
- Workshop on self-defence organized for students
- Several Class XII graduates secure admission in prestigious institutions like Avadh Girls Degree College, Isabella Thorborn College and Lucknow University. While some male students are pursuing engineering, fine arts, animation and multimedia.
- Majority of the students from the school readily get employed after completion of their under graduate program or vocational training diploma

CHALLENGES

- Being first generation to the school they don't get any support at home with homework, proper upbringing, health care and hygiene.

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

- English communication skills to be improved.
- Quality of teachers needs to be enhanced through regular in-house training programs. Qualified and experienced English medium educated teachers to be hired to cater to English medium classes.
- Need to develop a plan to enhance the overall academic performance and personality development of male students.
- Plans to enhance participation in sports by organising more inter-collegial sports events to foster sport excellence.

ABOUT

Founded in 1995-96, Unity Pvt. Industrial Training Institute (Unity Pvt. ITI) functions in a 30-room setup on the campus of Unity College to provide diverse vocational training courses to youth to support employability. Supported by patrons Mr. Shokat Alibhai and Mr. Mustafa Kassam, there is continuous focus on improving the quality of training delivered in order to reflect the changing industrial trends while at the same time adhere to government guidelines. Initiatives in the pipeline include the construction of a new building exclusively for Unity Pvt. ITI; purchase of equipment as per latest QCI standards; and the establishment of a dedicated placement cell. The institute has 250 trainee enrolment in NCVT affiliated trades and 200 in short-term courses.

Following courses affiliated with NCVT, Govt of India are available for training in the Institute: Draughtsman (Civil), Computer Operator and Programming Assistant (COPA), Sewing Technology, Stenography English & Hindi, Basic Cosmetology (formerly called Hair & Skin Care), Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Mechanic and Electrician

Following Short term Courses are being offered - Fashion Designing, Beautician, Cutting & Sewing, Spoken English & Personality development, Auto CADD, Tally, Office Automation, DTP, CCC, C++, and Java etc.

Regular sports, extracurricular activities, recreational, educational and Industrial tours are organized for the students.

SALIENT HIGHLIGHTS

- 100% pass results with students scoring more 75% on an average. 100% placement in all previous years. This year four pass out students have been appointed in different government departments.
- Institute in partnership with Cadd Centre, one of the leading institutes of cadd training in the country to provide best Auto CADD training to our Draughtsman Civil Trainees. Apart from Auto CADD, the training of 2D and 3D software has also been introduced in the course. Recently a batch of 18 trainees has received Auto-CADD (2D & 3D) training in the institute.
- GODREJ Center of excellence was established in the New Block this year 30 students were trained and most of them have been employed and remaining is now self-employed after this training.

The first batch of 15 students passed their final exam this year and got employed immediately.

U Veda Facilities have been updated as per Industry Standards and are continuously in the process of learning new software and technology. Nuke, Mocha, Silhouette and PF Track were introduced this year as Value Addition software.

- Enrolment short of reaching its maximum capacity both at school and hostel.

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

- Maximize the capacity of hostel through enrolment of meritorious students mainly in Grade V, VI and VII.
- Enhance awareness about the school and its quality facilities amongst Aligarh residents in order to increase enrolment of day scholars.
- English proficiency of students to be improved and conceptual knowledge in core subjects through remedial classes.
- Improve upon level of commitment & efforts towards raising the standards of Ideological & spiritual development of the students.
- Narrowing down on deficit through cost control & enhancing enrolment of students.

ABOUT

Former UN General Secretary Kofi Annan • once said, "Education is the premise of progress, in every society in every family". Reflecting this transformative power of education is TMT's Unity Education Programme (UEP) launched in 2004. Under UEP, deserving students are selected in rural and urban areas and provided costfree education which includes uniform, stationary and transport. There is special focus on including parents' active participation in their children's education. An annual Quality Control Test (QCT) is conducted to evaluate and maintain quality education standards across schools. At present, approximately 1500 students are enrolled in 19 UEP schools excluding Unity College Second Shift which has around . 1350 students.

SALIENT HIGHLIGHTS

- Focus on conceptual thinking and interactive way of learning as opposed to rote learning to develop a strong educational foundation in students
- Lower Nursery section opened in 5 schools
- Adoption of Montessori method of teaching drew good results
- Teacher's Workshops, Parent's Awareness Programmes, and Student's Counselling Sessions organized across schools to enhance quality of teaching and learning
 - Medical camps are organized every year, in all the schools
 - Rehabilitation of deserving families under UEP program

UNITY EDUCATION PROGRAM (UEP)

High performing students admitted in better school - 2 students in Aligarh university schools, 5 students in M U College Aligarh and 3 students in Unity College Lucknow.

KEY OUTCOMES

Total of 122 students appeared in X U.P. board exam 100% pass result with average aggregate marks scored by students 71% in 2020.

Target of 84% student attendance achieved.

In QCT (Quality control trust conducted by TMT) the average marks scored 53% against average of 63% in home exams. Total of 30 students appeared in XII U.P. board exam 100% pass result with average aggregate marks scored by students 60% in 2020.

10 of students scored above 90% in QCT and 16 students' achieved 100% attendance.

CHALLENGES

- 1. Lack of funds to expand and scale up the program outreach in U.P.
- 2. First generation to the school hence no family support towards learning process.
- Availability, affordability and accessibility of quality school in smaller cities and villages to get the students enrolled in sizeable numbers.
- 4. Turnover of teachers remain high in participating schools due to better job offers and marriages in case of female staff.

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

- 1. Replacing rote learning with conceptual interactive teaching methodology.
- 2. Improving upon students' proficiency in English.
- 3. Need to scale up model in other locations through others working in education of the underprivileged children.
- 4. Career counselling and guidance of students to get enrolled in employability generating vocational and professional courses.
- 5. Regular on job teachers training workshops.

HIZA (A.S) CHARITABLE HOSPITAL

HIZA (A.S) CHARITABLE HOSPITAL

ABOUT

Hazrat Imam Zainul Abideen (HIZA) Charitable Hospital, set up in 1991, provides medicines at nominal rates to those below the poverty line without any discrimination on the basis of caste, creed or religion. Since HIZA operates exclusively in marginalized areas which lack access to affordable, quality healthcare, its services are extremely beneficial for local residents. All services are free for widows, destitute, and orphans while other needy have to pay a nominal fee of Rs 5 towards consultation by a qualified doctor and medicines for one day. On an average 270 patients attend the OPD daily.

Additionally, immunization, diagnostic, and health and wellness awareness camps are routinely organized by HIZA. Microscopy DOTS Centre, a unit of WHO in collaboration with government TB Hospital, Thakurganj (Lucknow) is also running at HIZA. The Centre conducts sputum examination and provides quality anti-tuberculosis drugs free of cost. A record 90% of enrolled patients were fully cured of the disease in 2019. The launch of Homeopathy Centre is another success. There is also provision for the administering of First Aid to the injured.

The services of HIZA (AS) Charitable Hospital are partially subsidized with the support of Al Iman charitable Trust, Najafi House, Mumbai. As part of its modernization drive, HIZA has started issuing ID cards to patients and computerized every counter for optimum efficiency.

Plan is to renovate and expand the infrastructure to cope up with the demand for additional facilities and more consultants. HIZA CHARITABLE HOSPITAL

ABOUT

The Ministry of Health, India, has estimated that a whopping 63 million people slip back to poverty every year due to "mounting" expenditure over healthcare which neutralizes the gains of rising income and various government schemes aimed to reduce poverty.

Tackling this serous issue of healthcare access and affordability is TMT's Medical AidProgram which offes medical aid to thosebelow the poverty line through a network of hospitals for free or at a nominal cost. As part of cooperative partnerships between hospitals and TMT, patients are treated at nominal rates in select hospitals. In addition, TMT's donors enable the former to bear a share of the costs for diagnostic, procedural and medication fees. Total of 1108 patients were supported at TMT towards treatment, minor surgeries, medicine, Ultra Sound, X Rays, MRI, CT Scans, Pathological test.

LIFE SAVER CASES

TMT offers the life Saver Program in collaboration with M/s Sajjadiya Trust & CJMF Foundation of Canada. To date, more than 30 critical care patients in life-threatening conditions have received intensive care treatments under the program.

In number of cases the patients have been facilitated to avail substantial grants from Government towards high cost life saver treatments.

MEDICAL AID

The patients are offered financial assistance for regular treatment at TMT designated hospitals and at Era's Medical University Hospital. Support is also provided for pathological and radiological test and medication as per doctor's prescription. **KEY OUTCOMES**

Daily 250 to 300 patients attend TMT's HIZA outdoor hospital where they get consultancy and medicine at a token cost of rupees five.

All bills are paid directly to the hospitals, pharmacies or diagnostic centres.

Efforts have been made to seek government funding to subsidise treatment of life saver cases at SGPGI.

Total of 1150 cases were covered under medical aid program during 2019-20 Life saver cases are also supported by the trust mainly at SGPGI and KGMU (Reputed Government hospital). On an average TMT supports around 30 such cases every year.

HIZA Hospital played an important role in eradication of tuberculosis (TB) from the surrounding area through its WHO sponsored DOT centre.

CHALLENGES

- Limited resources and large number of needy applicants who don't have access to affordable medical services. Scope limited to Lucknow or to families of children enrolled in our free education program.
- Identifying and eliminating those who tend to pose as needy and try to avail benefits even though they can afford or try to seek assistance from multiple sources
- .
- In absence of government supported free medical assistance program the cost of treatment at private hospitals is high and at times not even reliable.
- Underprivileged families with no education end up seeking medical assistance from unqualified medical practitioners in their locality which can be fatal to their problem.

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

- To set up more OPD clinics managed by qualified doctors
- Enhancing the capacity and services at the existing outdoor clinic HIZA.
- Promote educative & preventive health careespecially within underprivileged families.
- Work to identify a medical insurance plan whose premium is affordable and can be supported by TMT.

The life saver program is offered through us by the M/s Sajjadiyya Trust & M/s CJMF Foundation of Canada.

IMPACTS

STORY 1

Mr. Abbas who does zari work to sustain his family was admitted at Era Hospital in early 2019 following complaints of chest pain. Fatima, his daughter, is under the educational sponsorship program of TMT. About 17 years ago she was identified through TMT Survey and admitted in Nursery at Unity College Second Shift and now she is pursuing B.Com 2 year from a very reputed Girls' Degree College of Lucknow. Mr. Abbas was once again grateful to TMT for timely financial help towards his cardiac surgery which saved his life.

STORY 2

Mrs. Fatima 30 years is suffering from an eye disorder due to which she is unable to do any household job. Treatment was done at Indira Gandhi Eye Hospital Lucknow. Her husband works in a private school. They have two daughters - 9y & 5y. They are both are studying at Unity College Lucknow. One of them has received a scholarship from TMT too. Medical assistance of more than Rs.52,000/- was given to the applicant by TMT for her eye treatment.

STORY 3

Mr Javed the only potential hope of a family has reached Class X in Unity College Second Shift. His parents are engaged in dwindling zari work, his sister has a problem in eyes which is being treated through TMT while his uneducated elder brother is a security guard who earns a paltry sum of Rs.7,000/- to sustain the family. Javed fell down and fractured his hand badly. TMT stepped in to get his complete treatment and now he is all fit to resume academics and shall be instrumental in changing the family situation on completion of his studies successfully.

STORY 4

Mr. Naqvi aged 49years is an employee in a private firm. He has a wife and 2 children studying in Class V and VIII who receive scholarships from TMT. He developed severe cardiac problem and was advised surgery. He had no savings and could not muster any funds for the treatment. He contacted TMT and we got his heart surgery at SGPGI Lucknow for a cost of Rs.1,25,000. He recovered and is Alhamdolillah taking good care of his family.

GENERAL AID

KEY OUTCOMES

The areas covered are Monthly monetary assistance, food aid, housing and house repair and micro finance for small businesses.

INR 10 million disbursed to 5300 general aid beneficiaries.

Micro-finance program enabled many youth and jobless to become financially independent. Elderly with disabilities assisted through monthly food aid and monetary assistance to live with dignity.

CHALLENGES

- Need is huge, resources are limited and with our priority being Education and healthcare we fail to scale up this program. We mainly keep it confined to Lucknow and those towns where we have our unity education program (UEP).
- 2. Identifying and eliminating professional/ habitual beggars who tend to pose as needy and try to avail benefits from where ever possible.
- 3. To educate and change the mind set of people to take up vocations and micro businesses.

AREAS OF IMPROVEMENT

- 1. Plan has been developed, promote and scale up of selfemployability through vocational training, entrepreneurship training and micro financing.
- 2. Establish a separate cell headed by a professional experienced in this area.
- 3. Enrolling needy families and individuals for government funded aid, support, finance programs by establishing a government designated enrolment centre under TMT management.

SUCCESS STORIES

SUCCESS STORY 1

Mr. Haider, a driver aged 40, was living happily with his wife and a young daughter of 4 years when suddenly he met with an accident and in spite of the best efforts and financial aid from TMT, he could not be saved. The devastated wife and very young daughter were immediately covered under monthly ration aid since Feb 2019. They also received blankets in winter. The daughter has been admitted to a nearby school under sponsorship of TMT.

SUCCESS STORY 2

Mr. Mohd Mehdi is a chronic patient of neurological disorder. He came in touch with TMT in 2010 while he was in a pathetic condition as head of the family was not in a position to earn a living. The family was counseled and their two children were admitted in Unity College Second Shift one at a time and monthly ration aid was extended for some time. By the Grace of Almighty children have reached class VI and class II. The family has been receiving Ramzan ration aid since 2010. The wife is doing zari work & also as a maid. Their family lives in a tin shed which was recently replaced. The regular medical assistance since 2010 is being extended from TMT to keep the head of the family and in extension the family, intact.

SUCCESS STORY 3

Mr. Raju, a poor zardozi worker surfaced in our routine survey when his daughter was enrolled in Unity College Second Shift, five years later his second daughter was also enrolled in Nov 2019 the family lost him to cancer. The widow of Mr. Raju was contacted, comforted and counseled. Her two children are already in our school in class III and upper nursery and the last son is just one year old. Monthly ration aid was immediately started for the family and the widow has been motivated to keep herself engaged to attain a possible degree of financial independence and dignity. She has Alhamdolillah started selling pickles door to door.

SUCCESS STORY 4

Ms. Kaneez Khuda visited us seeking help for treatment of her mother who had some backbone issue. This 30y unmarried lady lives with her unmarried elder sister & ailing mother. She lost her father and the two sisters sustained on embroidery work. We started the treatment of mother at Era Hospital Lucknow which continues and also supported the family through ration aid. The family is pious so they are extended almost regular financial help in lieu of tilawat of Quran e Kareem & roza ijara on behalf of the marhoomeen of donors.


SUCCESS STORY 5

Poverty seems to bring unending challenges, Mrs. Kaneez Jahan started her education guite late in Unity College second shift school but only after class VIII she had to guit because of her marriage. The life propelled for a short while before her husband was diagnosed with cancer who soon left as the ailment was in advance stage, at 25y she was a widow with two very young children to look after. Her 2 children were enrolled under the Unity Education Program of TMT. The daughter is now in Class II & son in the play group at Rose School. She lives at Alamnagar and does zari work which is insufficient for sustaining her small family thus she was enrolled in monthly ration aid of TMT. It would be a long wait as the children are too young but the silver lining is that they are taking interest in studies and Kaneez is determined educate them so to ensure that her story is not repeated for her children


TMT INCOME 2019-2020
