It all started on an ordinary evening in the late 1970's. Dr S. Kalbe Sadiq was at a relative's house in Old Lucknow when a man came in and said he had something to show him. He took Dr Sadiq to a dilapidated house where a young boy sat on a rickety cot, deeply engrossed in study under the light of an oil lamp. "He's my son," the man said. "He is keen to study and extremely hardworking. However, I do

Dr Sadiq wrote to a Mumbai-based acquaintance, Late Mr. Jafar Ali Aseel, asking him if he could support the boy's education financially. Aseel responded by sending over funds to cover expenses for the boy's two years of education. The beneficiary went on to complete his graduation with very good marks.

While happy over the boy's changed

fortune, Dr Sadig now felt for the thousands of other children who wanted to study but could not because of financial constraints. He continued to find such children. asking friends and acquaintances to sponsor their studies. Soon, however, he realised that to be really effective on a large scale, there was a need to take up the mission in a more organised manner. In 1984, professionals in the field of education were brought together and Tauheedul Muslimeen Trust (TMT) was formed. The name was inspired by the need for education as well as unity among the Muslims to rid the community of rampant ignorance and poverty.

The first institution to come up under TMT was Unity College, which started in 1988 in a small, rented

room with the most basic infrastructure and a handful of students. The fact that it was professionally run and driven by sincerity attracted several supporters to the venture. Using the same premises, the Unity College Evening Session started a decade later with nine students to provide underprivileged, deserving children free education. Today, both the institutions together have over 3350 students enrolled for academic pursuits on a state-of-the-art campus. Several educational and medical institutions as well as charity programmes are either run or supported by the Trust. TMT is grateful to its generous donors who have supported it throughout the journey and facilitated the transition of a dream to reality.

few months ago when I went to Iraq, I had the privilege to pay 'Marja-e-waqt' Ayatollah Sistani a visit for a private meeting. Among the many advices that he gave me, the foremost was to work towards bridging the differences among the Muslims. Due to grace of God, my advice to both Shia and Sunni congregations to boycott so-called Maulvis who stoke communal fire for ulterior motives was always welcomed.

At the meeting, the other mission assigned to me by the ayatollah was to work towards spreading literacy among weakest sects of Indian community on top priority. According to him, Shariat laws are not stagnant in nature but change as per the preferences and sensibilities of the changing times. Power comes through knowledge and hence it is extremely necessary for the community to gain knowledge and a broader insight into worldly matters. knowledgeable and self-reliant. He considered knowledge as the precursor to power and therefore suggested that I take up the work of educating our community and imbibe it in letter and spirit in the best possible way. The community must understand that in today's times, the mere pursuit of contemporary education and that of science will not suffice unless we strive to achieve excellence in these fields.

The ayatollah was also of the opinion that Muslims should spend a substantial part of their time and means on attaining knowledge and bringing about an educational revolution in the society. To give further impetus to imparting education, he permitted spending even the 'Sehm-e-Imam' for this noble cause. Avatollah Sistani's advice is consistent with the teachings of our fifth Imam Muhammad-e-Baqir (a.s) who said, "A Shia is one who, irrespective of the community he/she lives amidst, leads in knowledge, intelligence, morality, and prosperity.

Islam is not just about performance of rituals and ceremonial acts. For the betterment

of mankind, it has a comprehensive set of guidelines affecting all aspects of life. These guidelines are very thorough in nature and include physical and spiritual as well as public and private domains of our lives. It is indeed astonishing to realise that our Prophet (pubh) made us aware about such a flawless system, the fundamental principles of which will be applicable for every nook and corner of the universe till eternity.

earn Allah's wrath. They will not just face Allah displeasure on the Day of Resurrection but will have to compensate for their sins in this world too. It is not very difficult to identify the communities that will be aggrieved in the hereafter. These are the ones that are destined to live a life of disgrace and dishonour in this world. These communities don't enjoy economic well-being and are divided into small groups confronting each other and suffering thereafter.

Don't Muslims face such a fate the world over? Is it not selfexplanatory that the communities undergoing the afore-mentioned sufferings will have to face a greater predicament on the day of judgement? What's even more reprehensible is the misplaced belief of Muslims that mere association with Islam will make them rise above their moral responsibilities and the reigns of the world will remain with Islam.

However, Islam negates this thinking and the holy Quran mentions the eventual dominance of Islam in the world but not the supremacy of the Muslim community. The holy Quran puts to rest any ambiguity in the minds of Muslims, instructing them to mend their ways lest Allah replaces them with more pious and obedient disciples that will shun all pretense in the name of religion and will aspire to be its worthy followers.

The present scenario compels me to reflect at the flawed mindset of our so-called Muslim brethren who think that being a Muslim is sufficient for them to reach Jannat and they need not require good deeds to attain it. The holy Quran gives instance of Christians addressing themselves as sons of God. Initially, it was the Jews that addressed themselves as direct descendants of God.

These disciples can be recognized from their humble approach towards life. These pious followers are self-sacrificing and the ones who seek guidance from almighty in all their endeavours. They repent even for sins they didn't

Arabic and Hindi are extremely different in their approach and even customary letter-writing is very diverse. This contradictory approach of these two languages and the generation's ignorance in terms of Urdu leaves an impact on the Islamic know-how and understanding of the generations to come. It becomes particularly challenging to comprehend Islamic teachings in their true form without losing their essence in translation. This goes on to become an everyday predicament for Indian Muslims as the upcoming generation stands vulnerable to this sudden revolution. They are beginning to lose touch with Islamic code of conduct on an everyday basis.

How are these children supposed to comprehend basic rituals and norms when their parents are living in a state of ignorance and are unaware of even fundamental acts of ablution? The repercussions of this ignorance are deemed to be severe as unreliable elements and false dictums have begun to creep into our religion. By God's grace, a ray of hope has started to appear with the advent of Islamic channels like Ahlulbait Channel, Safeer Channel, Win channel, and Hadi TV. Things are beginning to look up with these channels' logical and sensible approach towards putting Islamic teachings in better perspective and the dissemination of information to masses. These channels strive to shun fabricated dogma and concocted stories that are meant to lead gullible masses astray. Therefore, it becomes

Some thoughts on issues concerning education in India

Perhaps there is no country where minorities do not co-exist with the majority; but nowhere have I found that the minorities live at the mercy of the majority government. In most countries across the world, including India, the leaders of the minority group pay special emphasis to their groups because being a minority, they have to work harder to come at equal footing with the majorities; the leaders have to work

harder to find solutions to issues, and to prove themselves.

When the Jews were driven out of Germany, they took refuge in America. Even there, however, they were not welcomed and treated disrespectfully. But despite such reception they did not resort to any protest marches or sit-ins, nor presented memorandums of demands to the government. Under the able guidance of their leaders, they quietly and gradually took hold of the financial and educational set

up. The result of such strategy was that 5% Jews became the uncrowned kings of the financial and educational administration of the country. The Jews in the past had entered America

at the latter's mercy, but now America relied on them. More or less, the scenario is similar for Chinese in Malaysia, and Parsis, Christians and Jains in India and Indonesia.

These minorities depend on their privately-owned schools and colleges and send their own children for higher education to universities in western countries. Muslims in India have a peculiar heritage. Here, Muslims only build mosques, Imambaraas and shrines and not schools and colleges. If, like the church, a web of model schools had also been built with the prayer halls, Indian Muslims would not have been downtrodden in all walks of life.

At the onset of Islam, mosques were also educational centres where religious education was imparted along with subjects like astronomy, geography and science. In fact, if history is to be believed, in the Prophet (PBHU) times, even sports were permitted within them to keep the body healthy and able. It is my firm belief that no political party or ruling government is capable of changing the conditions of Indian Muslims.

It is we, ourselves, who should

work unitedly with greater vigor to bring about an all-round progress and improvement in our community.

For this we will have to start a revolution to inculcate a craze for education in our children and society. We will have to build our own schools and colleges and have to create a movement among the young Muslims to join these schools and colleges.

In my opinion, those who are having resources should give priority to this cause above all other acts of charity. Unless we take up this responsibility on an URGENT BASIS, the situation will deteriorate from bad to worse and even few Muslim educational institutions that exist today will continue to see more number of non-Muslim students than Muslims.

We strongly believe in transparency and accountability, and are therefore always open to providing details of expenditure or to critical evaluation of our projects and programs.

TMT and ERA Educational Trust are two separate entities associated with me but I wish to make it clear that no charity money has been used to fund the development of ERA Medical College and Hospital.

Barabanki native Mohammad Abbas Zaidi secured 2nd rank in JEE in Lucknow this year. Abbas secured 83% marks in the exam.

Exhibiting great consistency and determined pursuit of excellence, Shakeb Hayder secured 94% marks in class X and 98% in class XII. He was eventually selected in CPMT and is currently a budding doctor at Jhansi Medical College.

Lucknow boy Raza Abbas Mahdi brought laurels to the community and his school, La Martiniere College, by securing 99.25% marks in ISC 2015 examination and topping the science stream. Focusing mainly on self study, Raza had earlier scored 97.8% marks in ICSE.

A student of Sacred Heart School, Muhammadabad Gohna (Mau), Sania Zehra secured 10 CGPA (Cumulative Grade Point Average) in CBSE's class X examination, making the community proud.

nity College was established in 1988 under the banner of Tauheedul Muslimeen Trust (TMT) by S Kalbe Sadiq. TMT had till then facilitated scholarships for deserving children, but it was felt that a dedicated educational institution would open up wider possibilities to serve the society. Operating out of a single room initially, Unity College today is spread over a sprawling 5.75 acre, Wi-Fi enabled, lush green campus.

Affiliated to ICSE Board, the college imparts quality and value-based education from lower nursery to Class XII. In Class XI, students can choose from Science, Commerce or humanities stream. Biotechnology has also been introduced in Class XI.

With well-lit, spacious classrooms, up-to-the-minute

computer and science labs, AC auditoriums, smart teaching aids, fully loaded library and other on-campus avenues for academic, intellectual and moral growth, Unity College promotes a culture of inquisitiveness and joyful creativity. Moreover, the college has a big football field, cricket pitch, basketball court and table tennis provisions with well-trained coaches to inculcate sportsmanship and give the students an opportunity to excel beyond academics. Recently, the college also installed 24 CCTV cameras to improve security on the campus.




Unity College Second Shift Lucknow

Inity College Second Shift started as a free quality education programme in 1999 with just nine students. Run in the second shift, the school engages the existing, state-of-the-art infrastructure of Unity College to give children from underprivileged backgrounds equal opportunity to achieve success. Today, more than 1400 students are enrolled in this evening school from Nursery to Class XII.

As in Unity College, the students have access to smart classrooms, a well-stocked library, computer lab, I-Cat room, science labs and a large playground. Till class II, there are no exams. For overall development of the students, several co-curricular activities like debate, extempore, creative writing, GK, quiz, essay writing, drawing competition, recitation competition, mathematics quiz, story-telling competition are conducted along with inter-house sports events.

Apart from complete fee waiver, the students are provided transport

large number of school and college students graduating every year in the country are tagged 'unemployable' by companies because they lack the basic technical know-how and skills required for gainful employment. Unity Private Industrial Training Institute (UPITI) came into being in 1995 with the aim to bridge this gap between industry expectations and student skills. The endeavor is supported by Mr Shokat Alibhai and Mr Mustafa Kassam.

The centre initially operated with a few enrolments in a small shed

at Unity College campus where the students were offered five trades affiliated to National Council for Vocational Training (NCVT). Since then, however, there has been no looking back.

Today, 260 full-time students are trained in 9 trades. This was made possible by an extension of infrastructure to an overall 11,000 square feet of covered area.

About 288 students are enrolled in short-term courses with high value in job market. With a work

force of 25 qualified trainers, care is taken to ensure a healthy teacher-taught ratio is maintained. UPITI has also collaborated with CAD Centre, a leading AutoCAD training Institute of

MU College Aligarh

With an aim to create the perfect blend of religious, moral education and modern, scientific knowledge, MU College was established in Aligarh in 1997. Affiliated to Indian Council for Secondary Education in New Delhi, MU College is today alma mater to about 350 students from across the country.

Spread over 126,000 square feet, the college campus comprises four main blocks: New Hostel Block, Old Hostel Block, School Blocks and staff residences. Twenty teachers and 35 support staff have been appointed by MU College to oversee academic and residential requirements of its students.

Unity Education Program

Because of its immense power to transform lives, education is often viewed as a basic human right. Former UN secretary general Kofi Annan in fact said that on the foundation of education rest the cornerstones of freedom, democracy and sustainable human development.

TMT's Unity Education Program, which provides free education to under-privileged children, functions on the belief that any child who seeks knowledge should find it irrespective of social and economic background. The aid offered by Unity Education Program includes school fee, uniforms, stationery and transport facility.

The idea was conceived in 1999 and is currently implemented in eight different districts of Uttar Pradesh,



Chhatisgarh and West Bengal.

Once the blueprint was ready, the program was launched in 2004 with just 11 students. Showing remarkable progress, it now provides tuition-free schooling to about 3,100 students in 25 private schools.

To maintain superior quality standards, new schools are visited and evaluated by the *Unity Education Program* team twice a year.



functioning in 1993 from a modest rented building located in the densely populated area of Kareli, Allahabad. Established under the management of Imamiya Education Society, headed by Dr. Rizwan Haider, the school has grown into a full-fledged English medium intermediate college affiliated to ICSE New Delhi.

The college houses 32 classrooms, physics, chemistry, biology and computer labs, library, snack bar and a play area built over 12,300 sq ft of land.

To facilitate holistic development of the students, Unity College, Allahabad conduct various inter-house and inter-school competitions. Co-curricular activities like calligraphy, recitations, art competitions, bulletin Board decorations are regularly organized to hone the artistic capabilities of young minds.

The college has now grown to accommodate the educational needs of more than 2200 students. This, year, as in last, the pass percentage in the ISC and ICSE Board examination was 100%. To cater to the needs of children coming from villages and having little or no education, Unity Intermediate College Saidpur was established on the sparsely populated outskirts of Allahabad. Affiliated to UP Board, the college follows the Hindi medium pattern and is spread over 12 bighas of land.

With state spending on health a mere 1% of the GDP, most of the healthcare costs are borne by private individuals themselves. This means that even ordinary illnesses take a major toll on families economically, while more serious ones can prove to be back-breakers.

Hospital pressing and significant. HIZA's fundamental purpose is the

delivery of health treatment, care and diagnosis as well as health promotion and preventative services primarily to under-privileged people.

Earlier established and funded by Ahlul Bayt Foundation, Najafi House, Mumbai in 1992, the hospital now operates under the administration of TMT. Located in old Lucknow, which is severely lacking in advanced health facilities, it provides medicines at nominal cost of Rs 5 to people living below the poverty line.

Physiotherapy, X-ray and pathological examinations and

physical therapy treatment for the handicapped, destitute and widows are conducted regularly at a nominal fee or cost-free at HIZA. It also facilitates minor surgical procedures in dentistry, ophthalmology, ENT, gynaecology and orthopaedics.

For medical awareness among the masses, regular campaigns are undertaken on personal hygiene, sanitation, hazards of smoking and chewing pan masala, STDs and other communicable diseases.Immunization and pulse polio programs are held once a week.



Medical Aid Program

he groundwork of all happiness is good health. However, quality healthcare remains unaffordable for a large section of the society, and even treatable conditions often turn fatal in want of timely medical attention.

TMT offers healthcare assistance to people living below the poverty line through a network of hospitals.

As part of a cooperative partnership between hospitals and TMT, patients are treated at lower cost in several hospitals. Our generous donors have enabled us to bear a share of the costs for diagnostic, procedural and medication fees. The hospitals that TMT has partnered with include Sanjay Gandhi Post Graduate Institute of Medical Sciences, King George's Medical University and Balrampur Hospital in Lucknow. A majority of the patients were treated at the Era's Hospital in Lucknow with the direct support of the C. J. M. F. Foundation of Toronto, Canada.

The Life Saver Program is offered through us by the Sajjadiyya Trust in Toronto, Canada. It has helped many critical care patients in life-threatening conditions to receive intensive care treatments.



A new lease of life

At the age of five, little Meesam developed a small lump on his chest. His father, a plumber earning Rs 5,000 per month had five other children to look after, and hoped the lump would go away with age. However, by the age of 9, the lump grew into a tumour and started affecting Meesum's daily life. TMT, which was already supporting two of Meesam's siblings with scholarships, realised that the boy needed urgent medical intervention.

The entire cost of Meesum's treatment at KGMU, was borne by TMT. In an operation lasting two and a half hours, doctors cut through the boy's ribs to remove the tumour. The medical feat was covered in the local media.

Meesum is now a healthy class II student and is assisted with full school fee, uniform and books by TMT.

General Aid Program

MT continues to provide assistance to those finding it difficult to make ends meet. More than 2,000 people have received financial aid, Ramzan food hampers, winter blankets and essential home repairs under the program.

In addition, the institution provides regular monthly ration and medical aid to families who have lost their breadwinners. For financial independence, TMT also facilitates setting up of small businesses by those without a stable income.

This is in line with our philosophy of rendering relief to the distressed and our vision of a more equitable world. TMT is hopeful of providing generous support to more such cases in the future and work towards furthering the cause of humanity and betterment of the society.



With three little children and meagre pay from zardozi work, 28-year-old Jamshed Husain felt the world around him collapse when he was diagnosed with cancer early in 2014.

Initially, TMT pitched in for Jamshed by sponsoring the education of his three daughters: Zarin (10), Butool (8) and Anamta (5), at Unity College Second Shift.

Subsequently, Jamshed's treatment was taken up, first at Era Medical College, and then at King George's Medical College, Lucknow. TMT now also assists the family with regular supply of ration every month as well as medicines and supplies like blankets. As the family has no regular source of income, a small stall of general items has been provided for sustenance.




Combined graph of TMT & Canadian Principal





Head wise Income
